Whereas, Urness Hall does have a coed floor; however, co-ed is defined as "for or serving both men and women alike," as opposed to a gender-neutral space which is defined as "a housing option in which two or more students may share multiple-occupancy spaces in mutual agreement regardless of students' sex or gender" (Brandeis University).

Whereas, the following higher education institutions offer gender-neutral housing options to all students (including first-year students) in order to create and foster an inclusive environment on their campuses: Amherst College, Colorado College, Connecticut College, Cornell University, Dartmouth College, Dickinson College in Pennsylvania, Hamilton College, Kent State University, Macalester College, New York University, Pennsylvania State University, Salem State University, University of Maine, University of Oregon, Washington State University, among others.

Therefore, be it resolved, that we, the Augsburg Day Student Government, propose that the third floor in Urness Hall be converted into an accessible gender-neutral floor, including gender-neutral bathroom and shower facilities, in order to create an inclusive community for first-year students.
